



A Matter of Perspective

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Dear Hocking River District Family and Friends,

It was May 1988, and I was standing with my Mom inside the Gateway Arch, known as “The Gateway to the West” overlooking the city of St. Louis to the west and the Mississippi River and southern Illinois to the East. What a fabulous and fascinating structure it is!

Depending on one’s point of view, the Arch can appear to be a few inches tall (from an airplane looking down) or a mile high (looking from the ground up). It could seem like a flimsy piece of art (from a distance) or a solid wall of steel (an arm’s length away). It could be the source of a great family memory or something we prefer to forget or avoid. This architectural wonder, known as the Gateway Arch, can appear to be different things to us, depending on our point of view.

It was a church meeting that afforded me the opportunity to see the famous Arch. My father, the late Rev. W. Jing Chow, was the chair of the West Ohio delegation to the 1988 General Conference of the United Methodist Church. While he was busy with legislative work, my Mom and I enjoyed the sights and tastes of St. Louis. And while we toured the city, Dad and the other thousand or so delegates busily prepared themselves for intense and holy conferencing.

Depending on one’s point of view, General Conference can be a lot of hard and agonizing work and/or it can be a time of great joy with worship and fellowship. It can be painful and hurtful and/or it could be filled with celebration and victory.

Those few days in St. Louis, with my Mom and Dad, gave me a new perspective on the Church. My limited understanding of the workings of the United Methodist Church expanded exponentially. I was in my first appointment out of seminary, and I didn’t know nearly as much as I thought I did.

Growing up in the church, I never really paid much attention to what a General Conference was or what it did. I knew about “Annual Conference” (which was synonymous with “Lakeside” for our family) and the individual churches I attended. In some naive way, my perspective as a youth was that every United Methodist Church was just like every other United Methodist Church - thinking, believing, and doing everything the same way.

What I eventually began to understand was that there are many opinions, perspectives, and beliefs in the Church as well as interpretations. Some of us believe our point of view is the only one or the right one. And so, some voice their opinions loudly, while others choose NOT to speak as much. That dynamic hasn’t changed much over the generations.

Thirty-six years after my first General Conference, I found myself (with Nancy), sitting in the Charlotte Convention Center in downtown Charlotte, North Carolina. This seemed like the first time in forever since the 1988 General Conference. Looking inward, I realized how my perspective has continued to evolve over the years, based on life experiences, personal relationships, and deeper understanding.

At the postponed 2020 General Conference held in 2024, there was a new perspective for many, if not most, of the delegates and other attenders. I experienced a sweet spirit of unity, harmony, and collaboration. Overall, it appeared that most of the decisions (yes or no) passed by a resounding majority (many over 90%), which is highly unusual for any church conference. While many sensed a hope-filled atmosphere, others experienced quite the opposite. Some liked the outcomes, others did not.

Overall, my experience of the recent General Conference left me with a sense of hope for the future of the United Methodist Church, but I also realize there is still work to be done. Many significant decisions were made. Some are yet to be finalized. I trust there is a renewed sense of pursuing our mission of “*making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world*” and not spending so much time and energy focusing on what divides us.

The theme of the General Conference was “and Know that I am God...” based on the verse: “*Be still, and know that I am God! I will be honored by every nation. I will be honored throughout the world.*” (Psalm 46:10 NLT)

Grateful to be on the journey with you! May we all learn to Be Still and know that God is God!

Regionalization Passes by 78%

This means that while we will remain united by our shared doctrine and theology, this legislation will allow each area of the world to do ministry in its own context.

Full Communion with Episcopal Church Approved

This will allow for the sharing of clergy and recognition of sacramental rights.
*Awaiting Episcopal Church Vote

Lower Annual Conference Apportionments

U.S. Annual Conferences will be asked to pay lower apportionments compared to what delegates passed at the 2016 General Conference. Conferences will shift from the current base rate of 3.29% to a base rate of 2.6% for 2025 and 2026. Then, if the apportionment collection rate is 90% or higher in those years, the base rate will jump to 2.9% for 2027 and 2028.

First Black Female President of the Council of Bishops

Bishop Tracy S. Malone, resident bishop of the East Ohio Conference, is the first black woman in the history of the worldwide denomination to be elected president of the Council of Bishops!

First Native American Bishop to Preside at General Conference

Bishop David Wilson, resident bishop of the Great Plains Conference was elected the first Native American Bishop in a historic election in 2022 and thus becoming the first bishop to preside at a General Conference in our history!

40 Year Ban on Gay Clergy Lifted

With a 93% approval rate, General Conference votes to remove the ban on ordination of clergy who are "self-avowed practicing homosexuals."

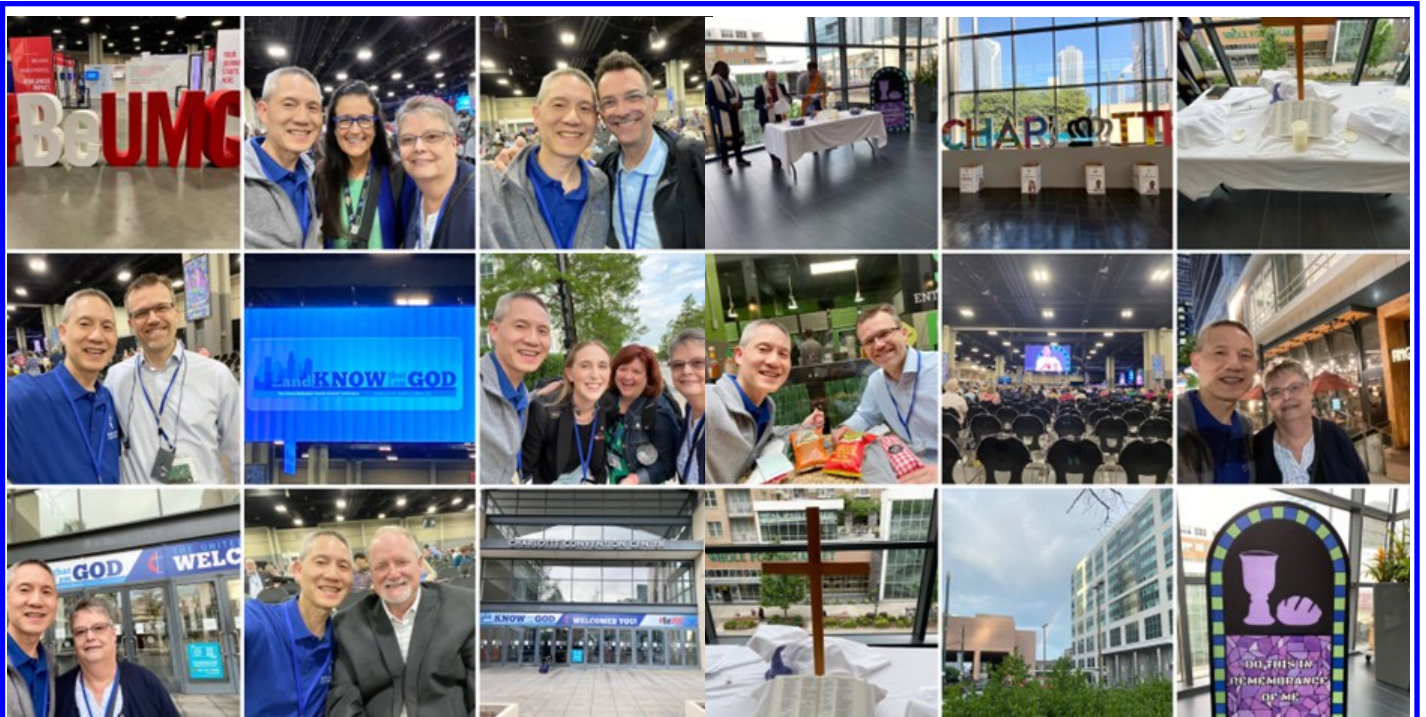
In addition, delegates voted that superintendents are not to penalize clergy or churches for holding -- or refraining from holding -- same sex weddings.

Social Principles Revised

General Conference delegates supported a revision of the Social Principles that deletes the phrase "the practice of homosexuality... is incompatible with Christian teaching."

Deacons Granted Sacramental Authority

Deacons can now offer Holy Communion and conduct baptisms where they have been appointed to serve, whether that is a church, outreach ministry or mission.

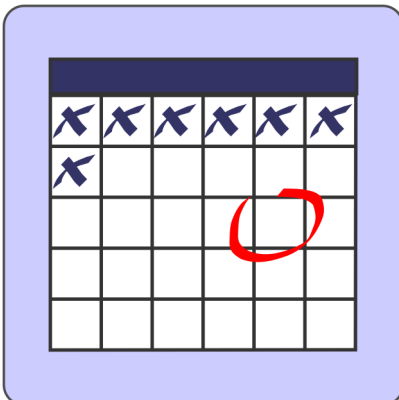
Lasagna Dinner Friday Night at Bexley UMC

MISSION OPPORTUNITIES AT GENERAL CONFERENCE

The Urban Farm Church at Maize Manor UMC is a sustainable urban farm where people come to center the heart, mind, body, and spirit, and serve their neighbors. Built in 2023, the 1/2-acre Farm produced and gave away 2,000 pounds of fresh vegetables in its first year, and expects to triple that in 2024! The 4.5-acre site also includes a meditation garden and wildflower prairie, and a 1/2-mile storybook nature trail is being built this spring.

DETAILS:

Come between 1:00 pm and 4:00 pm. Wear boots or old shoes; bring work gloves. Volunteers will receive a free Urban Farm Church water bottle! Adults, youth, and families with children are welcome!

WHAT YOU WILL BE DOING:

Learn about sustainable, urban agriculture and how your church can start growing food for your community! Tasks may include planting, weeding, watering, painting, or light construction. In case of rain, indoor activities may include painting and sorting clothing for our free clothing closet.

Charitable Pharmacy of Central Ohio is a non-profit, full-service pharmacy that provides medications to those who can't otherwise afford them. We began this work in 2010 and have grown to serve more than 1,600 patients with 100,000+ free prescriptions each year. Pharmacists and pharmacy students use each visit with our patients to help educate and empower them toward reaching their best health.

WHAT YOU WILL BE DOING:

This is an excellent team building event and requires no prior experience. The Charitable Pharmacy receives blister cards of donated medicines from nursing homes, and is able to up-cycle the medicines as a free source of inventory. These cards arrive in large boxes and require sorting. **Volunteers will join together to open these boxes, sort the cards alphabetically by the drug name, and then bundle them by like items and mark the expiration dates.** In doing so, you will help organize this important resource and make it usable for our pharmacy team to provide to patients. We'll end the sorting fun with a quick tour of the Pharmacy!

The Charitable Pharmacy can accommodate up to 25 volunteers from 1:00 pm - 4:30 pm on Wednesday, May 29th. The Pharmacy is located in Livingston United Methodist Church, 200 E. Livingston Avenue, Columbus, 43215 and is about 10 minutes from Capital University. Parking is available in the church lot.

Amina's Dream Team at Lewis Center United Methodist Church uses their sewing and non-sewing talents in support of Watoto Read, to create reusable menstrual kits to help refugee girls be able to stay in school while they are on their periods.

Watoto Read is partnering with Days for Girls International to provide menstrual hygiene products to middle school girls. Days for Girls has developed an ingenious patented kit that includes waterproof shields and absorbent liners which act as reusable feminine pads. The kit also includes a reusable bag for storing soiled hygiene items, underwear, soap, and washcloths. These are all provided in a discreet colorful drawstring bag. Each kit lasts for up to 3 years. The kits are provided to refugee girls along with reproductive health education. These kits will help girls stay in school, build their confidence, inspire vital conversations around female health, leadership, and safety as well as preserve dignity...all through addressing periods.

Cutting, sewing, sorting, etc.

Community Development for All People (CD4AP) began the Healthy Eating and Living (HEAL) program in 2012 in order to accompany people as they take steps to live healthy, balanced lives. The HEAL seeks to build a healthy community by increasing access to fresh food from the All People's Fresh Market, and engaging people in healthy eating and living activities. At the All People's Fresh Market, households earning less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines can shop for free, fresh produce every day that we are open (Tuesday to Saturday). New shoppers only need an ID to shop at the market.

WHAT YOU WILL BE DOING:

Volunteers assist with providing radical hospitality through greeting and welcoming shoppers (market members), stocking shelves, packing boxes for our drive through, signing-in market members (inside or outside drive-thru), and keeping the market clean as needed.

Six volunteers are needed on Wednesday, May 29th from 12:30 - 3:30 pm. (FIRST SHIFT THAT DAY.) Six volunteers are needed on Wednesday, May 29th from 3:00 - 5:00 pm. (SECOND SHIFT THAT DAY.)

General Conference Summary From Bishop Palmer

Dear friends in the West Ohio Conference,

It is my privilege to greet you again from the General Conference of The United Methodist Church. The work of the General Conference has been shaped by inspiring worship, intentional prayer and thoughtful pacing. It has been a joy to watch the ways that the delegates from the West Ohio Conference have been diligent in their service. They are true servant leaders. We all should feel good about this.

One of the things that I am convinced of in our culture is that we are driven by our consumption of headlines and sound bites. This is likely not news to you. Headlines are developed to draw us in but do not and cannot convey detail, depth and nuance. That said I want to highlight some (but by no means all) of the work the General Conference.

1. Adopted a budget four-year budget of \$353.6 (down 41%)
2. Adopted the Revised Social Principles
3. Approved entering into Full Communion with the Episcopal Church
4. Affirmed a renewed commitment to eradicating racism and colonialism
5. Eliminated "incompatibility" language regarding homosexuality
6. Removed the barriers to gay and lesbian persons being fairly considered for ordained, licensed and commissioned ministry.

These changes bring the Book of Discipline back to a neutral place where one group is not singled out for discrimination. It holds space for differing opinions within The United Methodist Church.

Let me reiterate the above is by no means an exhaustive list. There is so much more to tell and understand. But allow me to address a few obvious things.

The mission of The United Methodist Church continues to be making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. I am and will continue to be wholly committed to this mission and I expect you to be also. We should expect that of one another and encourage one another in this good work.

The removal of barriers to serving in vocational ministry is eliminating prohibitions but does not take the work of discernment away from District Committees on Ministry, the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry and the Clergy Session of the Annual Conference.

Clergy retain full discretion on determining for whom they will perform the marriage ceremony. They also retain primary responsibility for determining building use for religious services. Pastors are expected to work appropriately with local church trustees.

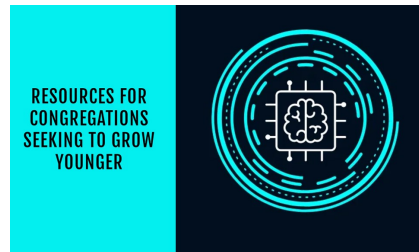
I will be meeting with the cabinet and staff May 6-7-8, following which there will be more to say. We will continue identifying and talking through the work of the General Conference and its implications for us over the next days and weeks including during Annual Conference. In the meantime, stay on mission and breathe and "be still." God is at work and God reigns.

Through daily messages, small group conversations, large & small group activities, devotionals and worship opportunities, each youth is encouraged to develop their individual relationship with Christ. Supported by adult volunteers, the camp Chaplain and their peers, Lakeside Institute provides a place for them to explore their personal faith beliefs, deepen their understanding of God's work in the world, ask questions, and prepare for a lifelong journey of faith.

The theme for camp this summer is "Finding the ME in the WE." Using Luke 1:28 and the story of Mary as an entry point, youth will explore what it means to claim their God given identity, while also remaining deeply connected to the larger community where they have been called.

While Lakeside Institute runs through East Ohio Conference, there is a long history of involvement from West Ohio as well. Hilliard UMC has several leaders on staff, including one of the deans (April Andrick) and this year's chaplain (Rev. April Blaine).
