WHY YOUR PRESENCE IS IMPORTANT FOR PEOPLE IN JAIL?

Jails catch people at their lowest points. They are on their knees and deeply broken. Your presence:

- Provides hope and encouragement that they can overcome anything. With God all things are possible.
- Opens the door for forgiveness
- > Helps change their thinking
- Creates opportunity for spiritual growth

We have to be like Jesus to them before they will believe in Jesus.

How do We Respond to a Person's Arrest and Detention?

- Be encouraging, compassionate, and non-judgmental. You don't need to know anything about jail, drugs, or their crime. Your role is to be Jesus with them in their season of despair.
- > Provide the gift of presence immediately and regularly.
- Pray with and for the person arrested, their family, and any victims.
- Create a care team to provide spiritual and tangible assistance to ALL of the family.

FOUR THINGS FOR PROVIDING SPIRITUAL GUIDANCE

- 1. Start with Prayer pray about the people you encounter and your own strength to disciple lovingly.
- 2. Create a judgment free zone judgment cuts off the pipeline of fellowship.
- 3. Listen intentionally No one listens to me; I'm going to listen to you. Do 3X as much listening.
- 4. Be consistent Consistently shows you care. Must discern what level of participation you can sustain consistently.

WHAT PEOPLE NEED WHEN THEY GET OUT OF JAIL.

- ➤ Someone to contact a relationship with someone who wants good things for them.
- > A ride to wherever they need to go this is very important.

 Can't meet Jesus if we're not there.
- Basic necessities food, shelter, clothing. Helps them feel safer during transition.

Transformation During Transition

GETTING INVOLVED IN JAIL MINISTRY TAKES THESE THREE STEPS:

- 1. Find out about the jail's process. All jails have a hierarchy and a process to place you with the right people.
- 2. Look within your church first for organic connections. For example, many churches have NA/AA groups that meet; so do most jails.
- 3. Find a champion within your faith community that is All In. Often this is someone who has experienced incarceration themselves.

THREE THINGS TO SUSTAIN YOURSELF:

- 1. Don't be afraid. You are not God.
- 2. Carry your Bible. It marks you as a believer.
- 3. Form a support system. You need your own spiritual team.
